In 2022, NCPW will continue to embrace the overarching message, 'Every child, in every community, needs a fair go'. This year we will be shining a light on children growing up feeling safe and supported.

This NCPW, we will be looking at what children are telling us, what families are telling us, what the evidence is telling us, and how to translate this knowledge into action.

We know that too many children are not growing up safe and supported and that child protection systems are overloaded. There are many opportunities to change the trajectory for these children.

We can stop child abuse and neglect – and reduce its impact – by working together to make sure every child in every community has a fair go.

Chatting with our children helps to build the strong connections that help them thrive.


A great place to start is by asking the best thing that happened in their day. Other tips for conversations with your children include:

- Remember what has been going on for your child so you can ask the best questions.
- Ask about their friends.
- Ask their opinions about things.

- Ask how they would solve problems.
 And respect their answers.
- If you are reading a book with your children, discuss it with them. Pause at the end of each page for them to comment.
- If your child doesn't respond to a question, don't push.
- Read a book to the students relating to child protection and ask them to talk about how they felt about the book and what child safety means to them
